



CHAIR'S REPORT

Welcome to our newsletter for Winter 2023.

Chorley Flower Show 2023

In July 2023, your dedicated Parish Councillors once again had a presence at the popular Chorley Flower Show. As always, the event took place in Astley Park. We met lots of people from the village and took note of any issues which were raised. It was great to talk about the work of the Parish Council and the success of various projects over the past year or so.

New play area opens to the public

West Way Sports Hub which opened in 2021 sees another £110,000 investment into area after Chorley Borough Council and Astley Village Parish Council funded the creation of a fantastic play area facility.

The brand-new play area at the West Way Sports Hub has been opened

by Chorley Borough and Parish Councillors and pupils from Buckshaw Primary School. The play area was joint funded by Chorley Borough Council and Astley Village Parish Council.

The new addition sees brand-new state of the art equipment for ages 1 to 12 years including a base climb unit inspired by the athletic disciplines of parkour, free running, and Ninja Warrior style challenges.



The Parish Council are delighted that the West Way play area is now open for all residents and visitors to enjoy and we encourage everyone to visit and try out these great facilities.

Love Clean Streets app

Lancashire County Council are promoting the use of the new 'Love Clean Streets' app, which can be installed on your mobile devices free of charge. The app allows you to report highways issues, as well as being able to take a photo and upload it, identifying the location of the issue. This will assist the highways staff and will mean that road/pavement defects are potentially addressed more efficiently.

Parking issues in the village

Ongoing parking issues in the village have been observed and reported along Chancery Fields, Chancery Road and Long Croft Meadow. As a result, the Parish Council have written to Lancashire Police and a representative attended the Parish Council Meeting on 1 November 2023 to discuss the matter.

Christmas 2023 event

This year's Christmas event will take place on Friday 8 December between 6pm and 8pm. We will gather to sing carols outside the community centre and light the Christmas tree. Afterwards, refreshments will be served. We hope you'll be able to join us for this popular village event!

This project was jointly funded by Astley Village Parish Council and Chorley Borough Council Neigbourhood priorities scheme.

Wildflower mini meadows and wildlife corridors

As we have all been aware, the strips of wildflower min-meadows along

Chancery Road have been disappointing this year.

Preparation and seeding was done in late Spring but the dry spell in June meant that most areas "failed". However, there were a few "bright spots" to be seen in late summer.

The non-mowing of the verges again produced some wildflower surprises, positive responses





from residents and attract criticism from others. The Parish Council will continue to support this project next year.

COUNCILLOR CASUAL VACANCY



Astley Village Parish Council have a vacancy for a Parish Councillor, which will be filled by co-option.

Any person wishing to serve as a Councillor should write to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, contact details are on page 15, giving details and information about themselves, background and why they wish to become a Parish Councillor.

To qualify, the applicants must meet the following criteria:

- be 18 years of age and;
- appear on the current register of the Voters List; or during the whole of the twelve months preceding the relevant date have resided in or within three miles of the parish; or
- during the whole of the twelve months preceding the relevant date
- have occupied within the parish their only place of work.

Applicants must not be debarred from standing as a Councillor (further information is available by contacting the Parish Clerk)

The village newsletter is produced by the Parish Council and distributed to all Astley Village homes. It has spaces for local businesses to advertise to subsidise the cost of its printing and distribution in Spring and Winter. A total print for the newsletter is 1600, delivered by local distributor to every house, just short of 1500 properties in Astley Village.

Besides this delivery, the Parish Council gives a supply to the Community Centre for visitors to collect, the shops and at Derian House. Also, the newsletter appears on the website.

Community Litter Pick

Astley Village Parish Council organise a litter pick on the first Saturday of every month.

Where?

We advertise the "Litter Pick" details on the two notice boards, one near the entrance to Hallgate and the other by the Community Centre.

When?

The meeting time is 10am. and one of the Councillors will be there to meet up with volunteers at the Community Centre and loan out litter pickers and gloves and provide bin bags for the rubbish collected. Where possible we try to recycle cans and plastic bottles.

How Long for?

Our volunteer collectors are encouraged to do the litter pick between 10am. and 11am. before returning their equipment to the Community Centre.

Success?

We have a varied number of people joining us on the litter pick. Sometimes just two to three turn up - sometimes family groups volunteer their time. At the last litter pick there were individuals and family groups making up a total of 13 volunteers. Of course the greater number of volunteers who join us the wider our coverage of the village .

Locations?

The area around the shops is a focal point for people of all ages. Despite there being four litter bins in the vicinity, some residents or visitors fail to place their litter in bins provided. Since the shop/post office changed management, there has been an improvement in the general appearance near the shop front but littering still takes place near the bench and pathways leading to the underpass to the car parks to the rear of the takeaway and the bushes near the Astley Inn car park.

Litter picking certainly isn't a case of blitz an area and the jobs done! There is no room for complacency. For some young people, adults and children, it is obviously acceptable for them to deposit rubbish near rather than in the bins provided. Added to that the are the drivers/passengers who throw rubbish from their car

windows into the verges and bushes.



Astley Village Parish Councillors reported their requests at the last Council Meeting, for bigger bins to be provided at the West Way Playground. The original one was far too small to hold all the rubbish being deposited, resulting in litter being blown around the area. We must try to encourage the young members of our community to use the bins but it is discouraging when their litter is wind blown all over!!

Other residents have commented on over flowing bins at the Hallgate car park. Many residents and visitors have been using them. However the bins were not being emptied sufficiently often and again litter was spilling out and being scattered by the wind. Members of the Parish Council have contacted Chorley Borough Councillors who represent Astley Village to seek a solution to these two situations. There were proposals for a bin to be replaced



with a much bigger one or more frequent emptying of the original.



It is very pleasing to report that two large bins are now installed at Westway and another large bin has been added to the path leading to Astley Hall. With the regular emptying programme we hope to see far less litter as overspill being blown around.

Please can we ask residents to be the eyes of the village and report any other bins which are causing an overspill problem.

Chorley Borough Council are working through their partnership with the Tempo charity to increase volunteering in our communities around the borough. One of the aims is to encourage the participation of young people so we have a challenge to work with pupils from local schools. But the scheme isn't just for children. The scheme is open to all members the community. Tempo aim to provide recognition of the regular contribution of volunteers through "Tempo

Time Credits". These have no monetary value, but a volunteer can earn them for the time they have spent contributing to their community. These can be exchanged within the Tempo Time Credit recognition network for a product, service or activity. Using Tempo Time Credits is a way for people to get involved in different activities, develop new hobbies, visit places they may not have been to before and get to know more people in their local area.

Tempo Time Credits can be used with a network of recognition partners for days out at local and national attractions, classes at local facilities or even for vouchers for shopping and entertainment. Tempo Time Credits new online platform also allows people to use Tempo Time Credits for a range of exclusive online offers.

Those who have volunteered report:

- * an improved quality of life,
- * an ability to do something for the community,
- * a way of making new friends
- * an opportunity in using their credits to try out new activities either individually or with a friend.

It would be great to build up a network of volunteers and bring people together on a regular basis. Imagine what we could with 20, 30 or more "Litter Pickers" working in the village areas or what about a weekly litter pick organised at a variety of times to fit in with the volunteers?

The equipment is there, we just need the volunteers to use it!!

Emergency repairs - All emergency repairs need to be reported by phone. Please call us immediately on 01772 667002. The line is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Emergency repairs that should be reported immediately include:

- Gas leaks
- Uncontainable water leaks
- Complete loss of heating and hot water
- Electrical or fire risk
- Property security

An emergency repair is any problem that could be a security risk or cause harm to you, another person or to your property.
