





Community Skip Day

In conjunction with Chorley Council and Places for People, another successful community skip day was held on Saturday 29 June 2024. Residents were helped to dispose of unwanted household items to help keep the village clean and safe.

Parking Issues in the Village

Events held at the former site of Chorley Rugby Union club in May and July 2024, resulted in more dangerous parking in the village. Councillors liaised efficiently with the event organisers, the Police and Borough Councillors regarding this issue. Residents also helped by reporting any incidents and also attending the Parish Council meeting in July to express their concerns.



Nature Reserve

The Parish Council have recently funded the refurbishment at the West Way Nature Reserve at a cost of £5,000, including the installation of new interpretation boards at the West Way Nature Reserve.





Chorley Flower Show 2024

In July, Parish Councillors had a stall at the popular Chorley Flower Show event for the third year running. As always, the event took place in Astley Park. We met lots of people from the village who were very interested in the work of the Parish Council and the successful projects we have provided support for. The Speaker of the House of Commons, Sir. Astley Village - Radar Speed Signs

During the Spring of 2024, the wires weere cut to the solar panel for the radar speed sign on Chancery Road (near Wymundsley) and it was just running on battery power. This was repaired in May 2024 but only a few weeks later, a resident made the Parish Council aware that both radar speed signs on Chancery Road had been vandalised and the wires had been cut meaning it could not get charged from the solar panel. Both signs have now been repaired but if you are aware of who caused the damage, please contact one of the Parish Councillors.

Parish Councillors attended Chorley's Remembrance Sunday service on Sunday 10 November 2024. The Chair laid a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council. Where possible, poppies were also attached to street signs throughout the village in the week before Armistice Day







Most people living within Astley Village are aware that the village was built long after the end of World War 2. Some have even commented on the relevance of the garden of remembrance, the poppies on the street signs, in a village which was built in the 1970s with building continuing into the 1990s.

As Remembrance is about commendation not celebration, I ask you to think on this. Next year 2025 marks 80 years since the end of the World War 2, meaning even the youngest of solders in 1945 will now be approaching 100 years of age.

That war will soon pass from living memory to history books. Surely that is worth commendation because if we do not learn from our mistakes of the past we will repeat them?

As already mentioned, the Parish Councillors attended Chorley's Remembrance Sunday service on Sunday 10 November 2024 and the Chair laid a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council. The wreath does not just commemorate the World Wars of the 20th Century, it also commemorates all campaigns, war, and emergencies we asked our young people to deal with, and the fact some never came back.

COUNCILLOR CASUAL VACANCY

Astley Village Parish Council have three vacancies for Parish Councillors, which will be filled by co-option.

Any person wishing to serve as a Councillor should write to the Parish Council via the Parish Clerk, contact details are on page 15, giving details and information about themselves, background and why they wish to become a Parish Councillor.

To qualify, the applicants must meet the following criteria:

- be 18 years of age and;
- appear on the current register of the Voters List; or during the whole of the twelve months preceding the relevant date have resided in or within three miles of the parish; or
- during the whole of the twelve months preceding the relevant date
- have occupied within the parish their only place of work.

Applicants must not be debarred from standing as a Councillor (further information is available by contacting the Parish Clerk)

The adverse weather conditions this year meant that no new seeding was done. However, bulbs planted and seeding from previous years meant that a variety of flowers were to be seen along Chancery Road along with self-seeded plants in the unmown areas.

Buttercups and Cows Parsley and one or two orchids were very evident at the same time.

Litter Picking and Residents Views

Our monthly litter picks (on the first Saturday morning of each month – 10 am until 11 am) continue to take place meeting at the Community Centre. We are never short of litter to pick up but unfortunately, we only have a few reliable volunteers who meet up and do a really worthwhile job of clearing litter and help to keep Astley Village a pleasant place to walk through.

Litter hotspots are the areas around the village centre near to the bench opposite the pharmacy and the shrubbery near to the takeaway and small car park adjacent to the post box. The paths leading down through the underpass towards the West Way playing fields and the paths leading to the school and the zebra crossing continue to attract 'litter louts'.

With the large numbers of cans and glass and plastic bottles being collected, Astley Village Parish Council have asked Chorley Borough Council about the possibility of two dual purpose - general litter/ recycling bins to be installed, to replace the smaller bins by the Buckshaw Primary School bus-stop and near the shops. It would be good for the litter picking volunteers to be able to recycle this type of waste, cleaning up the village AND helping the planet!!!!

Whilst we were out on our last litter pick, several residents stopped to talk to us about village matters. The state of the approaches to the underpass were mentioned, together with complaints about the lack of clear lighting near to the zebra crossing. Pedestrians complained about the dark paths at this location and the motorists mentioned the poor visibility - partially caused by the dim lighting but also the low branches of the trees. Pedestrians, especially children, approaching the crossing need to be well lit and clearly seen.

This conversation then turned to the speed at which some local residents and other motorists drive their cars through the village.

Astley Village Parish Council has contacted the County Councillor responsible for representing our village at County level, with regard to complaints from residents, especially those with mobility issues, who use shopping trolleys and walkers when using the bus service not having a dropped kerb at the Long Croft Meadow bus stop.

This was the response from Lancashire County Council:

"Our Highways Technician attended Chancery Road to conduct an inspection. The Officer has raised an order for two additional mobility crossings, unfortunately this will not be directly next to the bus stop in question due to the limited visibility. The sweeping bend in the road would create a road safety concern for pedestrians if we located one directly at the bus stop."

The two mobility crossings mentioned have been installed by Buckshaw Hall Close and at the bus stop for Mimosa Close!

Neither of these stops are helpful to residents using paths which come from Long Croft Meadow, Broadfields, Studfold or Foxcote.

What are your views on the Parish Council trying to get some speeding motorists to reduce their speed with extra road markings and signage? We have the speed indicators but are stronger methods needed? **Residents' views are always welcomed by the Parish Council.** Contact details are shown at the back of the newsletter.


Christmas 2024

Astley Village Parish Council has exciting opportunities for you to become one of our next Parish Councillors!

Applicants must not be debarred from standing as a Councillor.

Parish Councillors are required to attend six full council meetings per year (one every other month).



UEFA Champions League winners and La Liga champions Real Madrid arrived in Astley Village this summer - for a skills masterclass with Astley and Buckshaw Junior Football Club.

The event at West Way Sports Hub saw more than 68 boys and girls from Astley and Buckshaw Junior Football Club take part in sessions organised by coaches from the Spanish giants.







The masterclass came as Astley and Buckshaw Junior Football Club celebrated its 20th anniversary. The club, which provides playing opportunities for more than 500 children each week continues to grow in size, including a 500% increase in the number of girls playing on a regular basis.

Chair Darren Marsden said: "It was a real honour to have Real Madrid join us and share their knowledge and expertise with our junior stars.



"To have such a big club join us shows us just how far we've come in the last two decades, and our players didn't look out of place mixing it with the coaching staff.

"We're certain we'll uncover a few new Jude Bellinghams and Lionesses over the next 20 years!"

Emergency repairs that should be reported immediately include:

- Gas leaks
- Uncontainable water leaks
- Complete loss of heating and hot water
- Electrical or fire risk Property security

An emergency repair is any problem that could be a security risk or cause harm to you, another person or to your property.
