

Chairman's Message

It has been a lovely summer and a glorious autumn in Astley Village with lots of activity in Astley Park. Some of you may have attended "Picnic in the Park" or the summer theatrical performances and more recently Halloween/Bonfire Night and the Derian House "Sparkle". All of these events have been very successful and enjoyable but have sometimes caused parking problems in the village when the parking plan, Parish Councillors agreed with Chorley, has not been followed. Consequently the Parish Council will continue to press Chorley Council, to make the implementation of the parking plan, a condition of use when seeking permission to use the park for events. Our park is an asset we want to see used but consideration must be given to the safety and well being of Astley Village residents as well.



Residents will be aware of the work that has been ongoing around the community centre. The Parish Council has worked in conjunction with Chorley Council, who granted additional funding for this neighbourhood project and the Parish Council has made a contribution to the fencing and the new notice board (See article pg4).

Residents of Ravensthorpe and users of the bus stop close to Ravensthorpe will have noticed that the seat that was set in the grass, has been moved to face the direction the buses come from and to enable users to keep their feet dry. Bus stop users at Great Meadow also have a new seat provided by the Parish Council and a new planter has been placed on Chancery Road opposite the entrance to Broadfields.

Many of you will have seen the wonderful flower meadow, near to the walled garden in Astley Park, which was planted by Chorley Council, along with the Friends of Astley Park and Buckshaw Primary School. Well done to all involved, it was lovely! (See pg 6) The Parish Council are investigating developing a similar display on Chancery Road.

As the weather turns colder we begin to look forward to Christmas. Soon our living Christmas tree will be lit and all residents are invited to join the Parish Councillors for carols followed by refreshments in the community centre (See back page).

The Pony Club/Derian House field

Some readers may have received information about the use of the field next to Derian House which I believe is misleading.

As Chair of the Parish Council I wish to make it clear that I have not tried to stop Astley and Buckshaw Juniors from using this field. I and others members of the Neighbourhood Working Group have questioned the irregular route used to apply for a long term lease, that is all.

Following concerns raised by residents about parking issues along this stretch of Chancery Road, the Parish Council discussed this matter at it's meeting on Nov. 5th.

We agreed that increasing the number of pitches and matches on this site will add to the problems residents already experience and could lead to an accident if better parking arrangements cannot be found.

The Rugby Club is soon to be redeveloped, providing pitches that will be available for the community to use and parking is part of the plan.

Astley and Buckshaw Juniors already have a lease on the field behind Buckshaw Primary school in Astley Village and use pitches in Buckshaw Village. Perhaps with some careful planning better use could be made of these facilities and residents at this end of the village could be spared further parking hassle on Chancery Road and surrounding roads.

As this is not a decision for the Parish Council, we await the result of negotiations between the club and Chorley Council.

Neighbourhood Working

Although "neighbourhood working" with Chorley Council has been going on for some years now, the recent project around the community centre has been the biggest and most dramatic. The area has not been well maintained for many years and the 1970's design had been degraded so much that everyone seemed to have given up on it. The Parish Council proposed this project, which involved not only the two councils but also Places for People housing association. The first stage was reducing the hedge to the rear of the centre and removing a pair of trees that were overhanging the community centre roof. Then the brick and block flower beds were removed and new ornamental fencing installed along with a completely new tarmac surface. The project has far exceeded the normal neighbourhood budget but with pressure from Cllr Matt Lynch and the agreement of Cllr Bev Murray of Chorley Council, the funds have been found and the Parish Council have agreed to pay for a new notice board and additional fencing.


Village Caretakers

The Parish Council employs 2 caretakers to promote a clean, tidy and safe village environment. Their works focuses on Chancery Road and every week they litter pick, inspect and tidy up. They also undertake seasonal planting and planter maintenance and re-position the Speed Indicator Device . Each month they inspect and litter pick all other roads and footpaths/ginnels across the Village, including the Westway Community Nature Reserve. They

report damage, rubbish/graffiti, unsafe trees and other areas of concern so that partner organisations such as Chorley and Lancashire Councils or Places for People can undertake work they are responsible for.

The map below shows where and when their work is carried out. Residents may approach either the caretakers or contact the Clerk if they wish to request any tasks to be undertaken.

May 2015 Election

Thursday, 7th May 2015 will be election day, not only a General Election, to elect the next Government in Westminster, but local elections too.

You will be asked to vote for one of your Chorley Borough Councillor seats and all of your Astley Village Parish Councillor seats.

If you wish to be a Parish Councillor you will need to fill out nomination papers, which are available from the Elections office at Chorley Council nearer the time. A notice of election will be posted on the Parish Council notice boards, and on the website on or around the 2 April 2015.

On the right path

Another long standing issue in the village has been successfully tackled; two sections of path around the underpass have now been resurfaced after residents highlighted the problem to Councillor Matthew Lynch.



Also in that locality the bench at the bus stop has been moved closer to the bus shelter and turned 90 Degrees, It now gives those residents who use public transport greater opportunity to use it.



Councillor Lynch said "I am delighted that we have managed to resolve the damage to the path around the underpass and the relocation of the bench is a common sense approach from the Parish council which Chorley Council were happy to undertake".

A bit of the Exotic in Astley!

While reading about Roman Britain I found that the Romans grew large amounts of Saffron, mainly in the south of England. I came to the conclusion that if they could do it then I would give it a try, global warming being an advantage here in the UK and longer summers convinced me that it would be worthwhile.

I read, and noted that the Saffron crocus (*Crocus sativus*) liked dry well drained soil acid free and as much sun as possible. Quite a challenge as my garden is paved over however further reading said that pots would be fine. (Do not use plastic pots as I found they drained poorly and can rot the bulbs).

After studying as much as possible and finding a friendly supplier I purchased 50 bulbs (corms) from just outside Paris France. I planted 40 of the corms and gave 10 to a friend for his allotment as they had started sprouting and I managed to pot them in the second week of August, and within 6 weeks they flowered and produced saffron, so much so I harvested 0.9 grams from 120 flower heads. The quality being far superior to the Spanish brand as supplied to UK supermarkets



and with a monetary value of approximately £40.00 per gram.

The growing cost from bulbs to Saffron was approximately £20.00 and with the bulbs (corms) needing human intervention to multiply i.e. dug up and divided should reproduce up to 10 cormlets making further future purchases unnecessary. I am now enjoying Saffron tea sweetened with honey, along with homemade saffron flavored biscuits and would recommend that every gardener give it a try.

Community Growing Scheme

Places for People and Rock FM are sponsoring a community growing scheme for Astley Village residents. The objective is encourage residents to get together and grow their own food. Three of your parish councillors have been involved in choosing a site and the children from Buckshaw Primary school and local secondary schools have been consulted about what should be grown. The young people have also produced pieces to promote the project on Rock FM.

A number of potential sites were examined. A large derelict flower bed on Great Meadow was finally chosen as the best site. On 12th November a group of Places for People staff and volunteers from the army cadets cleared the bed and dug in a load of compost and manure. Hopefully by the time you read this the first planting will have taken place.


