However the main topic of discussion in the village has been the changes to the bus service! At the September meeting of the Parish Council, representatives of Stagecoach were invited to come and explain why the half-hourly bus service had not been restored after the work to

railway bridges in Chorley completed. had been Councillors were pleased to hear that the service was soon to be restored and would run between Chorley and Preston. However we were surprised to discover that the service would no longer run along Southport Road and would also run along the school side of the road for both journeys!

Having now used the bus service I can Christmas and a Happy New Year. confirm that residents concerns are well founded. The journey into Chorley takes much longer and can soon become

overcrowded because Eaves Lane residents and Astley Village residents have no alternative but to use the same small buses.

The Parish Council will continue to make representations on this issue. The changes to the bus service have also undermined the somewhat Parish Council's work to install seats at all the bus stops or get existing seats refurbished! We have decided to wait until the new service is established before spending your money on having seats relocated or ordering new seats. At present it also seems that these changes could leave us with redundant bus shelters and lay-byes too! See timetable on page 7.

We have had a busy year ensuring the planters in Cafe Ambio courtyard are well watered and tending the recently planted



Sensory Garden near the Queen's Road car park.

You may have seen us, on the odd Saturday morning, working in the river, litter picking or removing self seeded beech saplings to create more light for the river.

With the help from pupils from St Laurence CofE School and the Geo Cashers we have continued our efforts to rid the park of Himalayan Balsam, and, although we have managed to clear many areas, much remains. Sometimes it feels like a hopeless task.

Very soon bat boxes will be attached to some trees in the park. We would like to thank the teachers and pupils from both Southlands and St Michael's for putting them together for us. Thanks also to Steve Holgate who gave us the money from his LCC grant to enable us to purchase the timber and necessary materials.

This autumn pupils from Buckshaw Primary School will collect acorns and pot them, using materials provided by the Friends through a grant. When bigger the oak saplings will be planted in the park.

Finally, work is about to start on the construction of a reed bed where the river Chor enters the park, the aim being to improve water quality. This is a joint project involving The Friends, CBC and the Environment Agency.

The Friends of Astley Park will be ten years old very soon and many of its members have been involved since its formation. But there is always so much to do and new members are always welcome, whatever their capabilities and interests. We really enjoy the work that we do, working with CBC to make the park the beautiful place that it is and something that Chorley can rightly be proud of.

DERIAN HOUSE HAS A NEW PLAYGROUND

Derian House's special new playground is a really exciting development for the hospice, and is their first major building project in five years. The playground is one of very few in the North West where children with life-threatening conditions and their able-bodied siblings can play on the same equipment, thus enabling the whole family to play together.

It's been made possible by our friends at AO.com, who recently undertook a gruelling 600-mile cycle ride from their new operation German in Heppendorf, near Cologne, to their UK head office in Bolton to raise funds for the venture. They raised over £35,000 in sponsorship, which the AO Smile Foundation then match funded. meaning Derian House received over £70,000 from AO.



The children's park includes wheelchair-friendly roundabouts and swings and even a bespoke 'Hobbit House', all of which can also be used by their brothers and sisters as well as children cared for at Derian.

Georgina Cox, Derian House Chief Executive Officer said: "This amazing new facility is already making a huge difference to the lives of our families. Many of the children we look after who have life-shortening conditions also have a brother or sister, and there are not many places their parents can take them where they can play together. We are so grateful to the AO Smile Foundation and the staff who cycled such a long way to allow this to happen."

Explained AO's Chief Operating Officer, Steve Caunce: "The team here strongly believes in the fantastic work the hospice undertakes to support children and families across the North West, in the most difficult of circumstances. We are



thrilled to have been involved in the build of a truly life-changing children's park in the North West. Twenty of our staff have undertaken one of the toughest, yet most exhilarating challenges of their lives. They have trained for months, undertaking weekly group training rides around Rivington."

ASTLEY VILLAGE'S BUS SERVICE

From the 18th October, Stagecoach introduced a new bus service and timetable for the village. The Services 1, 1B, 2, 2A Chorley Hospital - Chorley - Coppull were be replaced by...

109A Chorley - Brooke Street - Eaves Lane - Harpers Lane - Chorley & South Ribble Hospital - Astley Village -Buckshaw - Leyland - Preston



Stagecoach said, "The **109A Service** will provide much improved coverage of the expanding Buckshaw Village development, operating from the top of Central Avenue, via Old Worden Avenue, The Hub, Tesco, Buckshaw Parkway Rail Station, Euxton Lane, Astley Village, Chorley & South Ribble Hospital grounds, Harpers Lane, Eaves Lane, Brook Street and Chorley Interchange. This provides new links from the Eaves Lane area and Astley Village direct to both Leyland and Preston! In Astley Village, buses will always operate an anti-clockwise loop, running northbound up Chancery Road for customers wanting either the Preston or Chorley bound buses. The direction of travel will clearly be shown on the front of the bus."

The 109A Bus operates every 30 minutes Monday to Saturday daytimes between Preston and Chorley and every hour in the evenings and Sundays between Chorley and Astley Village only.

Since the introduction of this new timetable, the Parish Council has received contacts about problems such as delays, full buses, not being able to access the Doctors, Schools and Tesco and has written to Stagecoach to ask them to rectify these.



CHORLEY FLOWER SHOW

The spectacular Chorley Flower Show, organised by Chorley Council, will be back by popular demand, to take place on Saturday and Sunday 30 and 31 July 2016.

Plans are already well underway to bring back some of the best exhibitors from across the country after the success of the first ever Chorley Flower Show, which attracted 10,000 people to Astley Park.

Councillor Alistair Bradley, Leader of Chorley Council. said: "We've been overwhelmed with the positive feedback about our first ever flower show so we wanted to set the dates for next year as soon as we could. There are already plenty of ideas of how we can grow and improve the show to really cement its place as one of Lancashire's main summer attractions for visitors to the watch out for region, SO more announcements in the coming weeks and months."

Exhibitors and traders interested in taking part in next year's show are being urged to get them in as soon as thev can. New elements for 2016 will include introducing show gardens to complement Chorley's award-winning RHS Chelsea Flower Show exhibit 'The Evaders' Garden' and increasing the variety of horticultural stands in the vicinity of Astley Hall.

If you've not booked your summer holidays next year make sure you keep the weekend free as it promises to be another fantastic event to put Chorley in the spotlight again.

THE EVADERS GARDEN

An amazing story of selfless bravery that began in 1943 involving an injured RAF navigator and a courageous group of French people has captured the nation's attention with Chorley Council winning a silver gilt with its first ever exhibit at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show.



Visitors to the world's prestigious most horticultural show were amazed by the story behind the garden saving. 'It's the best thing I've seen at Chelsea', 'Of all the exhibits this is the only one that makes you emotional 'l've and never seen anything like it'.

Chorley Council commissioned award-winning Chorley designer John Everiss to tell the tale of his father's amazing story when he beat the odds after being shot down over enemy lines during the Second World War.

John's design, 'The Evaders Garden', is formed to illustrate the bond between helper and evader in worn-torn France. His landscape features a unique sculpture of a young flyer, hiding up against the wall of a war-ravaged church.

A specially commissioned stained-glass window features two young French people, hands out-stretched to help, and steps leading out from the church suggesting the airman's eventual escape route.

"It's fantastic to have people talking about Chorley and we've been speaking to hundreds of people telling them where we are and what we have to offer," said Councillor Bradley of Chorley Council. "The garden came back to Astley Park in August in time for the new Chorley Flower Show and will also be a permanent feature attracting visitors to the town."

"It is also a poignant reminder of the sacrifices people made during the Second World War and will be a fitting tribute during the 70th anniversary year."

CHORLEY HERITAGE EXHIBITION

The Chorley Heritage Centre Group is currently holding its latest exhibition, on the upper floor in the Astley Farmhouse.

The Mayor of Chorley, Councillor Marion Lowe, opened the event on the 4th September 2015, which is centred on the past life of Astley farm, the Farmhouse, and the people who lived there; the Clitheroe family, and we were fortunate to have several members of the Clitheroe family present at the opening of the exhibition.

Also featured, is the discovery of a Bronze Age burial urn, found close to the Farmhouse during the construction works for the development of Astley Village; the site of the discovery, was approximately where the "Barons Rest" pub is situated.

Go and see the display and learn something about "The Dav the Farmhouse came to Life". The exhibition lasts until late January 2016, when the next display in the Farmhouse in February 2016 by the Heritage Group, will be a history of "Banks and Building Societies in Chorley" running until May 2016, but for one month only (February), a joint venture with a group from University of Central Lancs, who will concentrate on "The History of the **Co-operative** Movement in Chorley".

SKYLARKS COMMUNITY CHOIR NETWORK

The Choir is an enriching and exciting project taking place across Lancashire. The first choir was originally set up in West Lancashire and now three years later, there are four "Skylark Community Choirs" running across Central Lancashire in Ormskirk, Preston, Chorley and Lostock Hall. There are over 250 people attending these choirs every week. Anyone who is a resident in the area where the choir is based is welcome to come along and join in. It is stressed that

the choirs are not about people's ability to sing but about having a good time and enjoying music. The aim of our community choirs is to increase an overall sense of wellbeing and health, which contributes to the health and wellbeing of local communities.

The "Skylarks Community Choirs" have shown that singing brings people together and many new friendships have been formed. The Skylarks are not just regular community choirs. The ethos is one of inclusivity and we actively encourage and welcome everyone. We have a cross section of ages in the choirs as well as a number of younger people with learning difficulties. The sessions are fun, interactive, therapeutic and open to everyone. We aim to make singing and music accessible to all ages and abilities and to encourage people who think they can't sing to come and join us.

The feedback from people attending the choirs has been extremely positive and the benefits gained are clearly evident in the growing numbers of people attending the groups on a weekly basis. It is difficult to express in words the impact these groups have had on peoples' lives but a few of the comments made are outlined below.

'The best thing that could have happened to me. I have been ill for over a year, now I see some light at the end of the tunnel'

'I feel much happier since joining Skylarks and am enjoying life again'

'Feel down or stressedthen come to Skylarks. You will leave with a joyful buzz in your heart and a thrill to keep on singing!'

'Singing with the Skylarks lifts the spirits, increases the happiness and makes the sun shine again!'

These are just a few examples from hundreds! People attending the choirs have said that being part of a

community choir has made a huge difference to their lives. Some of the benefits include improved mood, feeling more positive and spiritually uplifted, an increase in self confidence and well-being. The aim of our Community Choir is to increase an overall sense of wellbeing and health through music and singing!

UPDATE ON THE CHORLEY RUFC SITE, CHANCERY ROAD, EUXTON

Brookfields was operated by Chorley RUFC from 1978 until the 2014/2015 rugby season. The Chorley Community Trust (TCCT) owns the Freehold of the Brookfields site and, on completion, the site will be operated by the Trust wholly owned subsidiary company Phase One Sport and Leisure.



In common with most unsubsidised amateur single sport sites and facilities throughout the UK the financial challenge became too great. It was decided that a Multi-Sport Year Round Activity Development at Brookfields - funded by disposing of part of the site - was the only sensible and pragmatic solution to ensure the continuance of Brookfields as a leisure and community facility. Therefore, The Chorley Community Trust (TCCT) was formed to deliver it.

During the delivery of the development - TCCT will invest up to 4 million pounds at Brookfields. The approved development will comprise - on completion in late summer 2016 – the following:

A full size floodlit grass soccer/rugby pitch; A Full Size floodlit Artificial Grass soccer/rugby pitch which, as well as full size use for soccer and rugby, will also be pre marked to provide facilities for 5/7/10-a -side football and Walking Football for over 50's (as franchise operations), Car parking on a lit and barrier controlled car park, Contract Cleaning, Contract Facilities Management.

There will be a 2 storey Brookfields Pavilion (visual of Pavilion above) containing many facilities, some being; a number of dry and wet changing rooms, Physiotherapy Clinic, Sports Injuries clinic, Spectator seating for 350 overlooking grass pitch, Fitness Suite, Red Rose Function Suite seating 180 banqueting style and 200 lecture style, Red Rose Bar and lounge, Sprung Dance Floor, Twickenham Bar and Lounge, Catering Kitchen.

The Pavilion will be multi functional with sliding acoustic screens to make smaller or larger spaces which can be used for Seminars, Conferences, Training or Meeting rooms, classes such as Zumba, Pilates, Yoga, Tap Dancing etc, Social occasions.

COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN (CAP) by Chorley Council

People in Astley Village want to see improvement in their local area and better outcomes for residents.

To help achieve this, a Community Action Plan (CAP) will be developed to identify priorities for improvement and set out how the community will work together, with support from other organisations, to deliver the plan.

A CAP is a medium to long term approach to improve the life of a community - so for Astley Village this is likely to be around improving opportunities for families and young people, increasing community cohesion and strengthening the commercial centre.

The plan will also include a number of short term actions to address any concerns that can be sorted out more quickly such as parking, traffic and other environmental improvements.

Astley Village will be one of four CAP areas across the borough to be delivered in partnership with the community and local organisations, complemented by Neighbourhood Working which will continue to deliver smaller improvement projects.
