During the Spring of 2016 our bus service was restored to run down both sides of Chancery Road, so consequently the Parish Council felt it was worthwhile installing more benches at bus stops. Little did we realise how much they would be needed by waiting passengers in September 2017. At our September meeting, following less than a weeks notice of the new timetable, which cut the bus service by 50%, the Council agreed to ask a representative of Stagecoach to attend our November meeting. We will keep residents informed of the outcome!

The Parish Council have taken further steps to improve the environment of the village centre and so I am saddened to see the results of some mindless vandalism, which includes the removal of a drainpipe from outside the pharmacy and the breaking of the magnolia tree planted by the WI to commemorate their centenary. Litter around the centre has increased as well, much of it around the new bench and litter



bin. This is our village and it is up to us to look after it.

On a positive note, Christmas is coming and the Parish Council has made all the arrangements for our annual village carol singing event. It will take place on 11th December at 7pm close to the Christmas tree, in front of the community centre. ## VILLAGE BUS SERVICE

When a Stagecoach representative attended the Parish Council meeting in 2016 we were promised an improved service which ran to Leyland and Preston as well as Chorley and the hospital. Well it only lasted 18 months and yet again without notification, let alone consultation our bus service has been cut in half.

Students, school children and people going to work have had their travel plans seriously affected. In fact many may have made different decisions about where they would go to college, school or work if they had known what was planned. Many have to make very early starts for much longer journey times and some have difficulty getting home.

These cuts occurred at the same time the County Council were introducing subsidised services in rural areas. Although Chorley Council and Lancashire County Council subsidise the evening and Sunday service, funding by Lancashire made available for rural bus services, is not being directed to Astley Village, where people need a regular service that enables them to visit the doctor or dentist etc.



Some of us look back to the days when the Chorley circular ran every 15 to 20 minutes and wonder why this service was axed, as it not only served Astley Village well but other areas of the town too.

Meetings have taken place between Stagecoach and the MP, as well as Councillors from Chorley and Lancashire. Suggestions have been put forward as to how a viable and regular service could run, which would restore our much needed bus into Chorley. The Parish Council have been consulted about supporting a service with funding from our precept. Discussions are still ongoing and as yet there has not been a positive outcome. The Parish Council will continue to press for a better service and we will keep residents informed of the outcome.

## FRIENDS OF ASTLEY PARK

This has been a very productive year for us with new ventures and earlier ones beginning to bear fruit.

The reed bed is coming along nicely and the River Chor now has a number of small fish which have attracted the attention of a Kingfisher. The pond in front of the Hall has regular visits from a pair of cormorants which means that there must be a significant number of fish.

One of the jobs which we undertake is the cutting back of some of the saplings which tend to create areas which are too dark for woodland flowers. Much time and effort has been spent on trying to control Himalayan Balsam which is swamping native plants in some parts of the park. Luckily, these plants are easy to identify and easy to pull up.

Our maintenance of the Sensory Garden is a regular activity and is certainly developing as the years pass. The wind-chime in the tree above the garden has a beautiful and mellow tone.

The group was represented at Chorley Flower Show and a large number of people visited our display but we did not manage to enlist new members.

We held two more 'Bat Walks' during the summer and the County's expert 'Bat Man', identified a rare type of bat bringing the total number of species in our park to 7.

One of our biggest enterprises is the restoration and recommissioning of a stone fountain which we believe was erected in the early 1800's. A small part of the stonework was sticking out of mud in a deep hollow.

On further investigation we found the three main sections of the fountain. We were fortunate to

obtain a grant from Tesco to assist the project, there was no way that we could have lifted the heavy stones by hand.

The fountain has been tested and works! We hope to complete the scheme before the end of November. The fountain is approximately 300m along the path from the Gate House on Southport Road.

We have written to the Council with suggestions for improvements to the playground both in regard to extending the range of equipment and improvements to the maintenance of the current facilities.

I would like to end with an invitation to join us. As you know we participate in a wide variety of tasks, some strenuous, others not so, such as tending the planters in the courtyard of Cafe Ambio and the sensory garden.

## VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS

As part of the Development Plan for the Village, the Parish Council has installed three further benches - one near the shops and community centre to replace an old metal seat, and two by bus stops near Broadfields and Judeland / Wymundsley.



All the bus stops in the Village now have seats for people to sit on while walking around the Village or waiting for a bus.

The Council has contracted with Chorley Council to plant up the stone and wooden planters and the plants used have certainly brightened up the Village. Residents have been very positive about the stone planters in the Village centre and the Council is planning to commission further stone planters to enhance the entrances to the Village.



*To qualify, a person must be a British subject, over 18 years old and an elector, must reside within Astley Village, or within 3 miles of it, or occupy as owner or tenant any land or premises therein, or have their principal or only place of work there, and must not be disqualified from holding office as a Councillor.*
