





Chairman's Message

It was good to see the residents who came to the Christmas carol singing event in December. There was an excellent turn out and most residents came into the community centre for refreshments afterwards. Thanks to everyone involved.

The improvements to the area around the community centre are nearing completion and the new notice board paid for by the Parish Council, which contains Parish Council and Chorley

Council information is now in use. The notice board outside the pharmacy will now be used to advertise community events. Contact the clerk to the council if your group wishes to advertise on this noticeboard.

Places for People have

upgraded the wall opposite the communitv the centre as part of community centre project and the Parish Council hope to get the wall to the side of the pharmacy improved as well as the wall of the community centre itself. The path edges in the area have been neatened and some work has been done to tidy the trees and hedging at the edge of Raventhorpe. When completed this area should look much improved and provide a pleasant public space.

Our next joint project with Chorley Council is intended to enhance Chancery Road by planting more trees and a wild flower meadow as well as enhancing the "gateway" to Astley Park through our village.

Residents may have noticed the new knee rail near to Derian House. This has been installed to protect the road crossing point from parked cars. The Parish Council will continue to lobby Chorley and Lancashire councils about

the problems associated with parked vehicles along Chancery Road especially when events are held in Astley Park.

At our meeting in March, the council agreed to increase the budget for village improvements by £1500. This will enable the council to install a new bench at the Buckshaw Hall Close bus stop, on the Derian House side, where residents wait to catch the bus into Chorley.

Although not in Astley Village the Council was consulted last year about the redevelopment of the Rugby Club site and now that notices have appeared on the site, we assume work will soon be starting. Early this year the Parish Council were consulted about the

redevelopment of the "Strawberry fields" site on Euxton Lane. Again although not in our parish, it will have an impact on the village. Whilst we felt the Rugby Club site was beneficial to residents we feel the change of use for the Euxton Lane site from industrial to housing and industrial, will have a very negative impact on Astley residents and all road users of Euxton Lane. We expressed particular concern about the number of cars that would be added to an already extremely busy road and the location of even more traffic lights in close proximity to the hospital and the complex Hartwood junction.

A new Parish Council will be elected in May, when the national and local elections are held. We would like to have representation from all areas of the village, so if you are interested in what happens in your locality, please consider standing.

To qualify, a person must be a British subject, over 18 years old and an elector, must reside within Astley Village, or within 3 miles of it, or occupy as owner or tenant any land or premises therein, or have their principal or only place of work there, and must not be disqualified from holding office as a Councillor. Annual Report of Astley Village Parish Council Year April 2014 to March 2015

The Council

During the year ending March 2014 the Parish Council worked hard to maintain and improve the village for its residents.

Councillors

During the period the Council was chaired by Councillor Laura Lennox with Councillor Rod Fraser as the Vice Chairman.

In this year the Council ran with one vacant Councillor seat. All the Council seats will be up for election in May 2015.



Astley Village Newsletter

The newsletter was given new consideration by the Council and will continue to be the Council's primary way of communicating with residents with two issues per year covering all aspects of the Council's work and will be distributed to every household.

It underwent a re-design in the last issue and is now a glossy A5 leaflet style, which has been well received by residents.

Website

The website, for those of you with internet access, is updated regularly and provides much information on the Council's finance, activities, projects and developments in the village. In addition it contains all Council minutes and documents relating to its business.

Council Employees

The villages two village caretakers, Ronnie and Jamie, contribute so much to the excellent condition of our village, litter picking, tidying and doing other tasks such as putting up the Speed Indicator Device, planting up the flower beds and more. Debra Platt, the Clerk, also continued her excellent work for the Council.

Value for Money

The Council spends the money it collects from residents wisely and uses it is for the benefit of Astley Village residents. Based on a band D council tax

property in the village, the approximate cost is 40p per week for the Parish Council's services during the year.

The Council Tax is collected by Chorley Council and costs residents an average of £21.16 for the year (based on a band D property). We hope you agree this is very good value for money.

The Council increased the village improvements budget to continue with the additional works in the village centre. This year it joined forces with Chorley Council to help it fund the changes in the centre with the new fencing, area adjacent to the community centre and noticeboards.



It also installed a new flower bed opposite the Broadfields junction and new seat at the bus stop by Great Meadow.

Summary

The Council looked forward to the challenges it faces in the coming years, due to changes to the Tax Base figures for the Parish Council. These changes

will affect its ability to raise the same levels of precept it has done in the past

and may affect the level of services to its residents. This is evident by some cost cutting measures it has implemented such as the reduction in the number of meetings held in the year, from 10 to 6, making meetings now every other month and newsletters down to two per year.

Restored Flower/Vegetable Beds

The first flower or vegetable bed on Great Meadow to receive a long awaited facelift has now been completed. Places for People were repeatedly asked by residents if they could take over the dilapidated beds and improve the area, now after a 10 year wait things are taking shape.



It has come at a cost to residents with an increase of up to 47p per week on top of the service charges that already apply making for an annual charge of approximately £340.00 (This is in addition to Council tax and the Parish Council charge).

PFP have set up a "Green Team" with selected residents involved, I have tried to enquire with regard to their intentions only to be told that no meeting has taken place for over a year (time of writing).



On a visual inspection of the area I found two more flower beds on Buckshaw Hall Close nearing completion.

Thanks have to go to the Scouts and Councillors who

attended to "dig in" the mound of top soil left on a dark cold evening.

I look forward to seeing the beds in full bloom as they will bring color back into the community rather than gloomy browns and greens provided by the over populated trees and shrubs

'Hello Astley Village!

My name is PC Mick Payne and I am the CBM for Buckshaw Village and Astley VIllage. I work along side PCSO Chris O'Lone and PCSO Vicki Green.

Astley Village overall has a low crime rate and reports of Anti Social behaviour have reduced over the past few months. I want to make sure residents take reasonable steps to prevent becoming a victim of crime, simple crime prevention can make all the difference.

Car crime is often thought to be committed by sophisticated high-tech criminals. In reality most of the crimes are opportunistic. The thieves simply wander around looking for any item left on show or a vehicle that's been left unlocked.

- Always keep your vehicle locked (including closing windows) even if you only leave it for a few minutes.
- If you can take your belongings with you rather than leaving in the car.
- Don't leave keys in a coat pocket and leave the coat unattended, be aware of dropping keys into bags or briefcases where they might remain visible.
- Most importantly LOCK YOUR VEHICLE! Double check it if your unsure.

Neighbourhood Officer Work

Chorley Council Neighbourhood Officers deal with many local issues such as Stray Dogs, Dog fouling, issuing tickets for littering and dog fouling, arrange dog chipping, fly tipping and much more.

Officers provide a service and you can call them on Chorley 515151 to report items. In the last year Officers have dealt with 274 stray dogs and issued 88 dog fouling tickets since the 1st January, across Chorley.

The Team has arranged a Dog Seminar on Saturday 27 June at 2pm to be held at Eaves Green Community Centre on how to recognise aggressive body language from dogs and what you can do about it. You can also learn emergency first aid for your dog should he/she be in a fight.
