## Chairman's Message

Welcome to our Spring Newsletter.

The Parish Council Christmas Carol singing event was even more popular than the year before but this time we were well prepared with ample supplies of mulled wine, orange juice, hot chocolate and mince pies! Parklands Band braved the rain as did the scouts and many residents, which resulted in the WI ladies serving a large crowd after the singing. Thanks go to all who assisted and to all who attended, for a very pleasant community evening.

Many of you will have noticed that a number of horse chestnut trees have been removed from the grass verge along Chancery Road, between Long Cope and Ravensthorpe. Sadly this had to be done because they were deceased and becoming dangerous. The Parish Council will try to get these trees replaced, along this stretch because not only do they make our village look attractive but they also help to soak up the water along a very damp stretch.

Last summer some of our planters were moved to the village centre along the grass verge opposite the school.

However, the wild life of the hedge proved to difficult to compete with, so this year we have moved the planters to hard surfaces! Two are sited outside the school next to the layby and two are in the village centre, one next to the new notice board and one close to the seat outside the shops. The council are now looking at options to renew this seat.



Residents may also have noticed that parking restrictions have come into force on the layby, reducing parking time to three hours. We still receive many complaints about parking at the

end of the school day, in this area. Parking is not allowed at all in the bus stop. Buckshaw Primary School regularly remind parents about parking issues but this problem still persists as does the parking problem along the grass verge close to Derian House. The council has written to Derian House again to try to reduce the problem.

As I write this column, the weather is cold and very wet, despite having been a dry winter. The spring bulbs are in full flower, so hopefully summer cannot be too far away.

## Annual Report of Astley Village Parish Council

Year April 2016 to March 2017

**The Council** during the year ending March 2017 the Parish Council worked hard to maintain and improve the village for its residents.

**Councillors** The Council was chaired by Councillor Laura Lennox with Councillor Keith Robinson as the Vice Chairman. Council lost one Councillor to non-attendance, and Mr John Nuttall was co-opted in November to fill the vacancy.

**Astley Village Newsletter** The new format of the newsletter continued to be well received. It is published twice a year covering all aspects of the Council's work and will be distributed to every household.

**Website** The new Council website came online in May 2016, which was funded by a Government Transparency Grant. It looks professional and contains a lot of information on the Council, local items and documents you can look up.

**Employees** Two village caretakers, Ronnie and Jamie, contribute so much to the excellent condition of our village, litter picking, tidying and other tasks such as the Speed Indicator Device, planting up the flower beds and more. Debra Platt, the Clerk, also continued her good work identifying and pursuing funding sources, such as the transparency grant.

**Village Plan** Council reviewed the village plan during the year, which was published in the newsletter. The plan informed the budget setting which was carried out in January for the new year beginning the 1<sup>st</sup> April. Some of the projects will be worked on with Chorley Council whilst others the parish council will look to support or develop itself.

In this year the Council has provided a number of wayside seats, whilst maintaining its displays of flower tubs around the village.

**Value for Money** The Council spends the money it collects from residents wisely and for the benefit of Astley Village residents. Based on a band D council tax property in the village, the approximate cost is 40p per week for the Parish Council's services during the year. This is collected by Chorley Council and cost £21.16 (on an average band D property) for the year 2016/2017. We hope you agree this is very good value for money.

**Summary** The Council is looking forward to making further improvements in the coming year.

## YOUR NEW BIN COLLECTIONS

Chorley Council has changed some of your Bin collections.

(GREEN bin) Domestic and non-recyclable waste will not change and still be collected every two weeks.



(BLUE bin) Recyclable waste such as plastics, cans, glass etc will not change and still be collected every two weeks. The pod in the bin will not be required, making your bins space larger.

(BROWN bin) Paper and cardboard will now be collected mixed together in the Brown bin, which you used to use for garden waste. This will be collected every four weeks from July 2017.

(GREY bin) Garden waste will now be chargeable. It is a voluntary opt-in scheme which costs £30 per year. For this you will get a new 240L Grey bin and it will be collected every two weeks from July 2017.

## LOCAL COUNCIL TAX

The Parish Council has in the past few years held the local element of the Council Tax for Astley Village residents - this year it has risen by 84p to £22.00 for the coming year of 2017/2018.

This gives the Council £20,480 to carry out its plans and projects in the village, and equates to approximately 42p per week per household (based on an average band D property).

### Do you know which health service to use?

With a number of healthcare services available, it can be difficult to know which service is best for you if you become ill. However, choosing the right care for your need can help to reduce demand on NHS services.

### Self care

Coughs, colds and sore throats can be treated at home with a well-stocked medicine cabinet. Stock up with medicines at home so you are prepared in case symptoms develop, and remember, if you have been prescribed medications, it's important to complete the course and comply with the directions given.

### NHS 111

If you are unwell but are unsure which service you need, NHS 111 is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The trained advisors can advise you on the most appropriate and available service for your need.

### Your local pharmacist

Your local pharmacist can give you advice and treatment for many common minor illnesses, such as a painful cough, runny nose, headaches and diarrhoea. They can also offer confidential consultations without the need for an appointment. Many pharmacies are often open late and at weekends.

### GP

Make an appointment with your GP surgery if you have an illness that won't go away, and is not an emergency. GPs can provide a range of services by appointment for issues

like back pain, stomach ache, and vomiting.

If you think you need to see a GP out of hours, call NHS 111. The trained operator will advise you on the most appropriate service for your need and, if necessary, will arrange for an out of hours doctor or nurse to call you to make an appointment with an out of hours GP at Chorley Hospital or Royal Preston Hospital.

### Urgent care centres

If you need urgent care for a minor injury or illness, integrated urgent care centres are now available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at Royal Preston Hospital and Chorley and South Ribble Hospital. GPs, nurses and advanced nurse practitioners at the centres can treat illnesses and injuries such as strains, cuts and sprains.

### 999 and emergency departments

999 and emergency departments are for patients with serious, life threatening injuries and illnesses, such as severe bleeding that cannot be stopped, breathing difficulties including choking or allergic reactions, heart attacks or strokes and loss of consciousness.

Chorley and South Ribble Hospital Emergency Department is open 8am - 8pm, seven days a week. Royal Preston Hospital Emergency Department is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Think carefully before dialling 999 or going to an emergency department as there may be another local health service available to you that is more appropriate for your need.

**Remember, if you are unsure which service to use, call NHS 111 any time of the day or night.**


## SMALL GRANTS FUND
