Chairman's Message

Welcome to the 2016 Autumn Newsletter.

Our bi-monthly meetings have continued to focus on the issues of concern raised by residents including parking overnight in the lay-by in front of school and long term parking in the main car park behind the shops. New parking restrictions have been introduced to cover the lay-by and Chorley Council are monitoring the car park. Parking associated with Derian House continues to be a cause of concern for residents on Buckshaw Hall Close and Long Croft Meadow as well as drivers using Chancery Road. The Parish Council will continue to lobby on this issue.

In the last edition of the Newsletter, I reported on the plans to link area will be in place in time for any icy Dutch Barn Close, in the hospital grounds, weather this winter. Chorley Council agreed with Edgefield. As expected the plans have not gone away and so a large number of residents, Councillors and Parish Councillors attended a 'consultation' in the hospital education centre in early October. The message was clear, that nobody wanted the problems related to hospital parking and traffic. We now await the expected planning application!

Plans for the redevelopment of the Rugby Club, which have featured in a previous edition of the Newsletter, have been amended and the Parish Council was consulted on the changes at a presentation during its' September meeting. When the development is completed Astley Village residents will have access to some of the best sports and social facilities in Chorley. The Westway playing fields will be improved and will include an all-weather sports pitch with

lighting, as well as improved access from Westway and parking for Astley Park events.

Our programme of providing, repairing and replacing seats at the bus stops has continued with two new seats provided over the summer. This follows the hard fought for restoration of our bus service on both sides of Chancery Road, which reinstated the bus stops.

However, residents and Councillors were shocked to find the seat at the bus stop close to Long Croft Meadow, was removed rather than repaired, as we requested! Hopefully the new seat we have ordered, will be in situ by the time you read this. Also, hopefully the rail down to the underpass from Ravensthorpe

DESTRUCTION OF HEDGES

This year some residents have cut through or removed boundary hedging along Chancery Road to replace garden fencing, create gateways or allow work to be done to their property. These hedges belong to Chorley Council and should not be touched without permission. Below is a statement from Chorley Council on this issue.

Many of the boundary hedges and trees in Astley Village are owned by Chorley Council. If you prune or remove Council hedges or trees without permission you could be subject to prosecution for criminal damage or damage to a protected tree. Please visit the Council's website, www.chorley.gov.uk and view the maps on line to check if the land is in Council ownership.

If it is, please contact the Council to discuss. It is your responsibility to seek permission of the landowner before undertaking any pruning work to hedges or trees.

PARKING ISSUES IN THE VILLAGE

The Parish Council continues to receive complaints about car parking in various parts of the Village.

Following representations to Lancashire County Council restriction notices have now been placed at the lay-by outside the school. As the photograph shows, these limit parking at any time to three hours so this should prevent the overnight parking of lorries.

The Council has worked with the school to try and limit parking on the corner of Hallgate at the start and end of the school day. A-boards have been placed there and seem to have had some success in deterring parking in the most dangerous areas.



The Council will continue to monitor this in dialogue with the school.

The parking outside Derian House continues to affect Chancery Road, Buckshaw Hall Close and Long Croft Meadow - as the photograph shows.



The new developments at the Rugby Club will provide hospital parking and it is hoped that Derian House can also negotiate spaces there to take traffic off the roads.

ASTLEY VILLAGE'S BUS SERVICE

Following concerns from residents and local councillors, Chorley Council with the support of MP Lindsay Hoyle, managed to secure an agreement with Lancashire County Council in March to fund the evening and Sunday 109A bus service through Astley Village.



Agreement has now been reached between Chorley and Lancashire to extend the current arrangements for a further six months. The 109A service will be jointly funded by Chorley Council (70%) and LCC (30%) under a single contract.

The Extended Agreement will ensure the routes continue to operate for the benefit of local residents, and will also allow for further exploration into more sustainable options for the future of these services.

Councillor Matthew Lynch said, "It is essential that residents of Astley Village have access to a bus service that works for them and provides those crucial links to local amenities such as Chorley Hospital, Tesco, Parklands Academy and the Town Centre. But residents must continue to use the service so we don't lose it in the future."

The reed bed is becoming established, along with the wetland wild flowers that we have planted around it. Native woodland trees and shrubs have also been planted on its slopes.

We would like to thank the teachers and pupils of Astley Park School who grew wild flowers for us. Sadly, though, some were destroyed as a result of mindless vandalism, but, thankfully, not all. So, in late summer, we planted 200 flowers of varying species by the sides of the woodland path in Great Wood. We are looking forward to the spring when, hopefully, they will grow and multiply and give pleasure to people for years to come.

A big thanks you, also, to Councillor Ralph Snape. With the help of a donation from his Council Grant we were able to purchase materials for 30 additional bat boxes and we would also like to thank the teachers and pupils from Parklands High School who constructed them in July. Members of our group have very recently erected these boxes in Dam Wood and Dogtrap Wood.



This year , in May and September, with the cooperation of the Council and The Merseyside and West Lancs Bat Group, we have organised evening bat walks. These proved to be very informative and enjoyable and we intend to organise more next year. You are most welcome to join us. By the way, did you know that 6 species of bats live in our park?

We enjoyed manning a stall at the Flower Show in July and were grateful for the many visitors who made donations to our funds.

I would like to end with an invitation to join us. As you know we participate in

CHORLEY RUFC SITE AND WESTWAY SITES

Chorley Council is working with Chorley Community Trust to create a variety of facilities in Astley Village that will host sports throughout the year and support events that take place in nearby Astley Park.

Back in 2015, Chorley Community Trust, which owns the Chorley Rugby Union Football Club site off Chancery Road, had plans approved to build a two-storey pavilion with a seated stand, viewing balcony, fitness suite, changing rooms and function suite, along with floodlit grass and artificial pitches suitable for a range of sports.

Now, changes to these plans are being considered to also include an extension to the approved pavilion, a care home, reconfiguration of the artificial and grass pitches together with the proposals on the Chorley Council owned Westway site, to build two grass pitches, one artificial grass pitch with floodlighting and an event car park. The two developments are set to be linked with a footbridge over Euxton Brook that will allow users to access the facilities across the site. The Westway Scheme will create up to 400 events parking spaces to be used several times a year during major events to alleviate parking issues in and around Astley

Village while the events are taking place.

The authority had lots of useful feedback during and following a public and stakeholder consultation held over the summer.



Issues raised included concerns over additional noise and light pollution from the floodlit pitches, the potential for additional congestion on the local road network and the potential inclusion of athletics and cycling facilities.

The proposals are currently being revised to address comments raised during the public consultation. It is expected updated proposals will be published later this year with a view to a planning application being submitted later this year or in the new year.
